Nan Adding Adverbials

Adverbials are words or phrases that provide additional but non-essential details about an action. Adverbials answer questions about the said action such as:

- ➤ Where did it happen? I saw a tiny bird on the window ledge. (PLACE)
- When did it happen? Last week, I went to visit my grandparents. (TIME)
- ➤ How did it happen? The visitors arrived most unexpectedly. (MANNER)

Adverbials can also provide interpersonal meaning reflecting a particular view about the action. For example: **Unfortunately**, she spoke too soon. (OPINION)

Task 1: Read through the following sentences from the story *Nan*. Identify the adverbial word or phrase in each sentence and indicate if it refers to place, time, manner or opinion. (HINT: Some sentences contain more than one adverbial.)

- 1. Next day, Mia accompanied her mother and Nan to Doctor Jenkins' surgery.
- 2. When told the bad news, she wasn't surprised.
- 3. Outside, all her beloved orchids had died of neglect.
- 4. Needless to say, the spade was hanging on the hook where Gramps always put it.
- **5.** Last Thursday, one of the neighbours called in when she saw my car outside.
- **6.** Apparently Nan lost her way home from the corner shop recently.
- 7. Sometimes she had Mia in fits of laughter.
- **8.** Nan disappeared into the study.
- 9. It was a beautiful autumn day, so Nan decided to go for a walk to the nearby park.
- **10.** Mia suddenly realised she was alone in the house.
- **11.** Panic-stricken, she grabbed her bike from the shed and began to pedal furiously.
- **12.** After her funeral, a staff member described a concert in the recreation room.
